

Announced Care Inspection Report 18 May 2017



03 Dental Studio

Type of service: Independent Hospital (IH) – Dental Treatment

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Inspector: Emily Campbell

1.0 Summary

An announced inspection of 03 Dental Studio took place on 18 May 2017 from 10:00 to 12:05.

The inspection sought to assess progress with any issues raised since the last care inspection and to determine if the practice was delivering safe, effective and compassionate care and if the service was well led.

Is care safe?

Observations made, review of documentation and discussion with Mr Damian Flanagan, registered person, and staff demonstrated that systems and processes were in place to ensure that care to patients was safe and avoids and prevents harm. Areas reviewed included staffing; recruitment and selection; safeguarding, management of medical emergencies; infection prevention control and decontamination; radiology and the general environment. No requirements or recommendations have been made.

Is care effective?

Observations made, review of documentation and discussion with Mr Flanagan and staff demonstrated that systems and processes were in place to ensure that care provided in the establishment was effective. Areas reviewed included clinical records, health promotion, audits and communication. No requirements or recommendations have been made.

Is care compassionate?

Observations made, review of documentation and discussion with Mr Flanagan and staff demonstrated that arrangements are in place to promote patients' dignity, respect and involvement in decision making. No requirements or recommendations have been made.

Is the service well led?

Information gathered during the inspection evidenced that there was effective leadership and governance arrangements in place which creates a culture focused on the needs of patients in order to deliver safe, effective and compassionate care. Areas reviewed included organisational and staff working arrangements; the arrangements for policy and risk assessment reviews; the arrangements for dealing with complaints, incidents and alerts; insurance arrangements; and the registered provider's understanding of their role and responsibility in accordance with legislation. No requirements or recommendations have been made.

This inspection was underpinned by The Independent Health Care Regulations (Northern Ireland) 2005, The Regulation and Improvement Authority (Independent Health Care) (Fees and Frequency of Inspections) (Amendment) Regulations (Northern Ireland) 2011 and the Department of Health, Social Services and Public Safety (DHSSPS) Minimum Standards for Dental Care and Treatment (2011).

While we assess the quality of services provided against regulations and associated DHSSPS care standards, we do not assess the quality of dentistry provided by individual dentists.

3.0 Methods/processes

Questionnaires were provided to patients and staff prior to the inspection by the practice on behalf of the RQIA. Prior to inspection we analysed the following records:

- staffing information
- complaints declaration
- returned completed patient and staff questionnaires

During the inspection the inspector met with Mr Flanagan, the practice manager and the dental nurse. A tour of the premises was also undertaken.

Records were examined during the inspection in relation to the following areas:

- staffing
- recruitment and selection
- safeguarding

- management of medical emergencies
- infection prevention and control
- radiography
- clinical record recording arrangements
- health promotion
- management and governance arrangements
- maintenance arrangements

4.0 The inspection

4.1 Review of requirements and recommendations from the most recent inspection dated 21 April 2016

The most recent inspection of the establishment was an announced care inspection. No requirements or recommendations were made during this inspection.

4.2 Review of requirements and recommendations from the last care inspection dated 21 April 2016

As above.

4.3 Is care safe?

Staffing

One dental surgery is in operation in this practice. Mr Flanagan is the only dentist working in the practice and he is supported by a dental nurse and a practice manager. Discussion with Mr Flanagan and staff and a review of completed patient and staff questionnaires demonstrated that there was sufficient numbers of staff in various roles to fulfil the needs of the practice and patients.

No new staff have been recruited since registration with RQIA; however, induction programme templates were in place relevant to specific roles within the practice.

Procedures were in place for appraising staff performance and staff confirmed that appraisals had taken place. Staff confirmed that they felt supported and involved in discussions about their personal development. A review of one personnel file evidenced that appraisals had been completed on an annual basis. There was a system in place to ensure that all staff receive appropriate training to fulfil the duties of their role.

A review of records confirmed that a robust system was in place to review the General Dental Council (GDC) registration status and professional indemnity of all clinical staff.

Recruitment and selection

A review of the submitted staffing information and discussion with Mr Flanagan confirmed that no new staff have been recruited since registration with RQIA. It was confirmed that, should

staff be recruited in the future, robust systems and processes have been developed to ensure that all recruitment documentation as outlined in Schedule 2 of The Independent Health Care Regulations (Northern Ireland) 2005 would be sought and retained for inspection.

There was a recruitment policy and procedure available. The policy was comprehensive and reflected best practice guidance.

A staff register was in place.

Safeguarding

Mr Flanagan and staff were aware of the types and indicators of abuse and the actions to be taken in the event of a safeguarding issue being identified, including who the nominated safeguarding lead was.

Review of records demonstrated that all staff had received training in safeguarding children and adults as outlined in the Minimum Standards for Dental Care and Treatment 2011.

Policies and procedures were in place for the safeguarding and protection of adults and children at risk of harm. A revised safeguarding adults at risk of harm policy was submitted to RQIA on 22 May 2017. The safeguarding children and revised safeguarding adults policies included the types and indicators of abuse and distinct referral pathways in the event of a safeguarding issue arising with an adult or child. The relevant contact details for onward referral to the local Health and Social Care Trust should a safeguarding issue arise were included.

Management of medical emergencies

A review of medical emergency arrangements evidenced that emergency medicines were provided in keeping with the British National Formulary (BNF), and that emergency equipment as recommended by the Resuscitation Council (UK) guidelines was retained. A robust system was in place to ensure that emergency medicines and equipment do not exceed their expiry date. There was an identified individual with responsibility for checking emergency medicines and equipment.

Review of training records and discussion with staff confirmed that the management of medical emergencies is included in the induction programme and training is updated on an annual basis in keeping with best practice guidance.

Discussion with staff demonstrated that they have a good understanding of the actions to be taken in the event of a medical emergency and the location of medical emergency medicines and equipment.

The policy for the management of medical emergencies reflected best practice guidance. Protocols were available for staff reference outlining the local procedure for dealing with the various medical emergencies.

Infection prevention control and decontamination procedures

Clinical and decontamination areas were tidy and uncluttered and work surfaces were intact and easy to clean. Fixtures, fittings, dental chairs and equipment were free from damage, dust and

visible dirt. Staff were observed to be adhering to best practice in terms of the uniform and hand hygiene policies.

Discussion with the dental nurse demonstrated that they had an understanding of infection prevention and control policies and procedures and was aware of their roles and responsibilities. The dental nurse confirmed that they have received training in infection prevention and control and decontamination in keeping with best practice. Training records were available for inspection.

There was a nominated lead who had responsibility for infection control and decontamination in the practice.

A decontamination room, separate from patient treatment areas and dedicated to the decontamination process, was available. Appropriate equipment, including a washer disinfectant and a steam steriliser, have been provided to meet the practice requirements. A review of documentation evidenced that equipment used in the decontamination process has been appropriately validated. A review of equipment logbooks evidenced that periodic tests are undertaken and recorded in keeping with Health Technical Memorandum (HTM) 01-05 Decontamination in primary care dental practices.

It was confirmed that the practice continues to audit compliance with HTM 01-05 using the Infection Prevention Society (IPS) audit tool.

A range of policies and procedures were in place in relation to decontamination and infection prevention and control. These were not reviewed during the inspection.

Radiography

The practice has one surgery which has an intra-oral x-ray machine. In addition there is an orthopan tomogram machine (OPG), which is located in a room adjacent to the surgery.

A dedicated radiation protection file containing the relevant local rules, employer's procedures and other additional information was retained. A review of the file confirmed that the dental nurse has been authorised by the radiation protection supervisor (RPS) for their relevant duties and has received local training in relation to these duties. It was evidenced that all measures are taken to optimise dose exposure. This included the use of rectangular collimation, x-ray audits and digital x-ray processing.

A copy of the local rules was on display near each x-ray machine and clinical staff had signed to confirm that they had read and understood these. Mr Flanagan and the dental nurse demonstrated sound knowledge of the local rules and associated practice.

The radiation protection advisor (RPA) completes a quality assurance check every three years. Review of the report of the most recent visit by the RPA demonstrated that the recommendations made have been addressed. The x-ray equipment has been serviced and maintained in accordance with manufacturer's instructions.

Quality assurance systems and processes were in place to ensure that all matters relating to x-rays reflect legislative and best practice guidance.

Environment

Since the previous inspection, the reception and waiting area have been refurbished. The environment was maintained to a high standard of maintenance and décor.

Cleaning schedules were in place for all areas which were signed on completion. A colour coded cleaning system was in place.

Arrangements are in place for maintaining the environment. Documents reviewed included a review of general health and safety risk assessments; control of substances hazardous to health (COSHH) assessments; portable appliance testing; fire detection systems and fire-fighting equipment; and legionella risk assessment. Hot and cold water temperatures had been monitored and recorded on a regular basis in keeping with the legionella risk assessment control measures.

It was confirmed that robust arrangements are in place for the management of prescription pads/forms and that written security policies are in place to reduce the risk of prescription theft and misuse.

Patient and staff views

Twenty patients submitted questionnaire responses to RQIA. All indicated that they felt safe and protected from harm. Seventeen patients indicated they were very satisfied with this aspect of care and three indicated they were satisfied. No comments were included in submitted questionnaire responses.

Two staff submitted questionnaire responses. Both indicated that they felt that patients are safe and protected from harm and were very satisfied with this aspect of care. No comments were included in submitted questionnaire responses.

Areas for improvement

No areas for improvement were identified during the inspection.

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4.4 Is care effective?

Clinical records

Mr Flanagan and the dental nurse confirmed that clinical records are updated contemporaneously during each patient's treatment session in accordance with best practice.

Routine dental examinations include a review of medical history, a check for gum disease and oral cancers and that treatment plans are developed in consultation with patients. It was confirmed that patients are informed about the cost of treatments, choices and options.

An electronic patient record system has been introduced since the previous inspection. Electronic records have different levels of access afforded to staff dependent on their role and responsibilities. Appropriate systems and processes were in place for the management of records and maintaining patient confidentiality.

Policies were available in relation to records management, data protection and confidentiality and consent. These were not reviewed during the inspection.

The practice is registered with the Information Commissioner's Office (ICO) and a Freedom of Information Publication Scheme has been established.

Health promotion

The practice has a strategy for the promotion of oral health and hygiene. There was a variety of information available in the waiting area promoting oral health. In addition oral health is promoted on an individual level with patients during their consultations. Mr Flanagan keeps abreast of good practice in relation to oral health promotion through journals and good practice research. A copy of the NICE guidelines 'Oral health promotion: general dental practice, December 2015' was available.

Audits

There were arrangements in place to monitor, audit and review the effectiveness and quality of care delivered to patients at appropriate intervals which included:

- x-ray quality grading
- x-ray justification and clinical evaluation recording
- IPS HTM 01-05 compliance
- clinical waste management
- clinical records
- patient satisfaction survey
- new patients
- the patient experience
- oral cancer risk factors
- waiting times
- prescription safety
- medical history
- review of complaints/accidents/incidents

Communication

Mr Flanagan confirmed that arrangements are in place for onward referral in respect of specialist treatments.

Staff meetings are held on a regular basis to discuss clinical and practice management issues. Review of documentation demonstrated that minutes of staff meetings are retained. Staff confirmed that meetings also facilitated informal in-house training sessions.

Staff confirmed that there are good working relationships and there is an open and transparent culture within the practice.

A breaking bad news policy in respect of dentistry was in place.

Patient and staff views

Nineteen of the 20 patients who submitted questionnaire responses indicated that they get the right care, at the right time and with the best outcome for them; one patient did not respond. Eighteen patients indicated they were very satisfied with this aspect of care and two indicated they were satisfied. The following comment was provided:

- “Very satisfied with all care and overall wellbeing.”

Both submitted staff questionnaire responses indicated that they felt that patients get the right care, at the right time and with the best outcome for them. Staff indicated they were very satisfied with this aspect of care. No comments were included in submitted questionnaire responses.

Areas for improvement

No areas for improvement were identified during the inspection.

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4.5 Is care compassionate?

Dignity, respect and involvement in decision making

Mr Flanagan and staff demonstrated a good understanding of the core values of privacy, dignity, respect and patient choice. Staff confirmed that if they needed to speak privately with a patient that arrangements are provided to ensure the patient’s privacy is respected.

The importance of emotional support needed when delivering care to patients who were very nervous or fearful of dental treatment was clear.

It was confirmed that treatment options including the risks and benefits were discussed with each patient. This ensured patients understood what treatment is available to them in order that they can make an informed choice. Staff demonstrated how consent would be obtained.

Interpreter services are available, if required, for patients whose first language is not English.

The practice undertakes patient satisfaction surveys on an annual basis. Review of the most recent patient satisfaction report demonstrated that the practice pro-actively seeks the views of patients about the quality of treatment and other services provided. Patient feedback whether constructive or critical, is used by the practice to improve, as appropriate.

Patient and staff views

All patients who submitted questionnaire responses indicated that they are treated with dignity and respect and are involved in decision making affecting their care. Eighteen patients indicated they were very satisfied with this aspect of care and two indicated they were satisfied. No comments were included in submitted questionnaire responses.

Both submitted staff questionnaire responses indicated that they felt that patients are treated with dignity and respect and are involved in decision making affecting their care. Staff indicated they were very satisfied with this aspect of care. No comments were included in submitted questionnaire responses.

Areas for improvement

No areas for improvement were identified during the inspection.

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4.6 Is the service well led?

Management and governance arrangements

There was a clear organisational structure within the practice and staff were able to describe their roles and responsibilities and were aware of who to speak to if they had a concern. Staff confirmed that there were good working relationships and that management were responsive to any suggestions or concerns raised. Mr Flanagan is the nominated individual with overall responsibility for the day to day management of the practice.

Policies and procedures were available for staff reference. Observations made confirmed that policies and procedures were indexed, dated and systematically reviewed on an annual basis. Staff spoken with were aware of the policies and how to access them.

Arrangements were in place to review risk assessments.

A copy of the complaints procedure was available at reception. Staff demonstrated a good awareness of complaints management. A complaints questionnaire was forwarded by RQIA to the practice for completion. The returned questionnaire indicated that no complaints have been received for the period 1 April 2016 to 31 March 2017.

A system was in place to ensure that notifiable events were investigated and reported to RQIA or other relevant bodies as appropriate. A system was in place to ensure that urgent communications, safety alerts and notices are reviewed and where appropriate, made available to key staff in a timely manner.

Mr Flanagan confirmed that arrangements were in place to monitor, audit and review the effectiveness and quality of care delivered to patients at appropriate intervals. If required an action plan is developed and embedded into practice to address any shortfalls identified during the audit process.

A whistleblowing/raising concerns policy was available. Discussion with staff confirmed that they were aware of who to contact if they had a concern.

Mr Flanagan demonstrated a clear understanding of his role and responsibility in accordance with legislation. Information requested by RQIA has been submitted within specified timeframes. It was confirmed that the statement of purpose and patient guide are kept under review, revised and updated when necessary and available on request.

The RQIA certificate of registration was up to date and displayed appropriately.

Observation of insurance documentation confirmed that current insurance policies were in place.

Patient and staff views

Nineteen of the 20 patients who submitted questionnaire responses indicated that they felt that the service is well managed; one patient did not respond. Eighteen patients indicated they were very satisfied with this aspect of the service and two indicated they were satisfied. Comments provided included the following:

- “Very well treated and service is second to none.”
- “Yes, I feel treatments are well explained.”

Both submitted staff questionnaire responses indicated that they felt that the service is well led and that they were very satisfied with this aspect of the service. No comments were included in submitted questionnaire responses.

Areas for improvement

No areas for improvement were identified during the inspection.
