4.0 Inspection summary

An announced variation to registration inspection of Braefield Nursing Home took place on 3 January 2020 from 09:30 – 11:00 hours.

This inspection was underpinned by:

- The Nursing Homes Regulations (Northern Ireland) 2005
- Department of Health, Social Services and Public Safety (DHSSPS) Care Standards for Nursing Homes, April 2015

The inspection sought to assess two applications submitted to RQIA for variations to the registration of Braefield Nursing Home. The first submission was an application to increase the number of places registered from 50 to 53 beds. The second application was to increase the number of registered places for patients with dementia.

RQIA were contacted by two relatives who raised some issues with the proposal to make the entire ground floor a dementia unit. Following a review of the floor plans and an inspection, to review the operational use of the home, RQIA were satisfied that there are sufficient facilities throughout the home to accommodate the patients and the proposed changes.

The variations to registration of Braefield Nursing Home were granted following this inspection.

This inspection resulted in no areas for improvement being identified. Findings of the inspection were discussed with Mandy Mitchell, Responsible Person and Philomena McIlwaine, Registered Manager, as part of the inspection process and can be found in the main body of the report.

Enforcement action did not result from the findings of this inspection.

4.2 Action/enforcement taken following the most recent inspection dated 31 July 2019

The most recent inspection of the home was an unannounced care inspection undertaken on 31 July 2019. Other than those actions detailed in the QIP no further actions were required to be taken following the inspection on 31 July 2019.

5.0 How we inspect

Prior to the inspection a range of information relevant to the service was reviewed. This included the following records:

- variation application information
- a review of the floor plans by the estates inspector, including the provision of communal space across the entire home
- overview of notifications submitted since the previous care inspection
- any written or verbal information received by RQIA
- Statement of Purpose
- Patient Guide.

Areas for improvement identified at the last care inspection were reviewed and assessment of compliance recorded as met, partially met, or not met.

The findings of the inspection were provided to the person in charge at the conclusion of the inspection.

6.0 The inspection

6.1 Review of areas for improvement from previous inspection(s)

6.2 Inspection findings

6.2.1 Variation application to increase the number of registered beds

The home is currently registered for 51 patients. Two large bedrooms, on the first floor, have recently been reconfigured to create four new bedrooms thus increasing the number of bedrooms to 53. Each room was completed to a high standard and has been tastefully decorated and furnished with a range of furniture. There was lockable storage provided in each bedroom. All of the rooms had an ensuite toilet and shower room. Call bells were in place in the bedrooms and ensuite bathrooms; ensuite accommodation was also equipped with emergency pull cords connected to the nurse call system.

The home's statement of purpose had been updated to reflect the change in the number of registered places. The registered manager confirmed that staffing would be kept under review and adjusted, if required, in response to patient need as occupancy increased.

The registered manager confirmed that the home's fire safety risk assessment had been reviewed and amended to reflect the changes in the number of registered rooms and amendments to the environment.

6.2.2 Variation to application to increase the number of places for patients with dementia.

The home is registered to provide dementia care for 13 patients. These patients are currently accommodated in a designated unit on the ground floor of the home. An application has been submitted to increase the number of registered places for patients with dementia to 23 with the intention of creating a larger unit for patients with dementia across the entire ground floor.

We observed that there was a range of sitting rooms available throughout the home of varying sizes. In addition to the sitting rooms there are a number of areas suitable for patients to spend their day, if they wished. On the first floor of the home there is a spacious reception area with a selection of comfortable seating; a wall mounted television has recently been provided for patient entertainment. Patients will continue to have the choice of spending their day in their bedrooms in keeping with their personal preference.

A lifestyle café with tea and coffee making facilities is located on the ground floor; this facility is for the use of all the patients in the home. Management have confirmed that the cafe will continue to be an invaluable resource for patients and their visitors.

There are three dedicated dining rooms throughout the home with sufficient space to accommodate all of the patients should they wish to come to the dining room for their meals. Patients will continue to have the choice of having their meals in their bedroom in keeping with personal preference.

A new designated smoking area has been created outside at the rear of the home. The management team confirmed that prior to changing the smoking arrangements they had consulted with the patients who smoke, no objections were raised to the proposed changes. The home's Statement of Purpose has been updated to reflect that the smoking arrangements.

No areas for improvement were required to be issued for this inspection and the variations to registration of the premises were granted from a care perspective.

7.0 Quality improvement plan

There were no areas for improvement identified during this inspection, and a QIP is not required or included, as part of this inspection report.



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
