1.0 Summary

An announced premises inspection of Strangford Court took place on 01 December 2016 from 10:25 to 11:50.

The inspection sought to assess progress with any issues raised during and since the last premises inspection and to determine if the nursing home was delivering safe, effective and compassionate care and if the service was well led.

3.0 Methods/processes

Prior to inspection the following records were analysed: Previous premises inspection report, statutory notifications over the past 12 months, duty call log.

During the inspection the inspector met with Ms Claire Quaill, Registered Manager and Mr Stevie McCormick, Estates Officer with Four Seasons Health Care.

The following records were examined during the inspection: Copies of service records and in-house log books relating to the maintenance and upkeep of the building and engineering services, legionellae risk assessment, and fire risk assessment.

4.0 The Inspection

4.1 Review of requirements and recommendations from the most recent inspection dated 30/09/16

The most recent inspection of the nursing home was an unannounced care inspection. The completed QIP was returned and approved by the specialist inspector on 18 October 2016. This QIP will be validated by the specialist inspector at their next inspection

4.2 Review of requirements and recommendations from the last premises inspection dated 26/02/15

No requirements or recommendation were made at the previous inspection.

4.3 Is care safe?

A range of documentation in relation to the maintenance and upkeep of the premises was presented for review during this premises inspection. This documentation included inspection and test reports for various elements of the engineering services and risk assessments. Documentation relating to the safe operation of the premises, installations and engineering services was presented for review during this premises inspection.

A range of fire protection measures are in place for the premises. This includes a fire detection and alarm system, emergency lighting, first aid fire-fighting equipment, structural fire separation and protection to the means of escape.

The standard used by the registered person to determine the overall level of fire safety within the premises takes account of the interaction between the physical fire precautions, the fire hazards, the number of service users, the management policies and the availability of adequately trained staff. This standard has been referenced in the fire risk assessment which was carried out by a risk assessor holding professional body registration for fire risk assessors.

This supports the delivery of safe care.

There are arrangements in place for routine premises management and upkeep as well as timely breakdown/repair maintenance. Service users are involved where appropriate in decisions around the upkeep of the premises.

This supports the delivery of effective care.

The areas of the premises reviewed during this premises inspection were well presented, comfortable, clean, free from malodours and adequately lit.

Service users are consulted about decisions around décor and the private accommodation where appropriate.

This supports the delivery of compassionate care.
