# When to Call 999

You should only call 999 for an ambulance in a medical emergency when it is obvious that you or another person is in a life-threatening condition. Think **AMBULANCE:** 



edical Emergency e.g diabetic coma, seizures

lood loss, Broken Bones, Severe Burns

U nconscious

eft or right sided weakness

A llergy with airway problem

N ot breathing





### Verything else – Consider an alternative e.g GP / OOH GP / Minor Injury Unit / Pharmacist / District Nurse

It is not the role of NIAS to lift uninjured residents who have fallen - this is an inappropriate use of the service.



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## Appropriate Care Pathways

The Northern Ireland Ambulance Service is much more than just a transport service. Paramedics now have a range of options which may mean a patient is referred to a specialist and treated at home or transported to a facility, other than the Emergency Department, which is more appropriate for their needs.

#### **Examples of Appropriate Care Pathways:**

#### **District Nursing**

Referral to district nursing teams for conditions such as blocked catheters, dressings, peg tubes etc.

#### COPD

Referral to community respiratory teams for patients presenting with an exacerbation of COPD.

#### Diabetes

Referral to diabetic specialist nurses for patients who have had a hypoglycaemic episode.

#### **Palliative Care**

Referral to specialist nurses for patients with end of life care needs.

#### Frail / Elderly

Referral to care of the elderly led services for frail / elderly patients.

#### Examples of Alternative Destinations:

#### **Minor Injury Units**

There are 6 minor injury units across NI which can treat a range of minor injury presentations and prevent unnecessary ED attendance.

#### Frail / Elderly Units

NIAS can provide transport to a number of units across NI which offer specialist care of the elderly input e.g BCH Direct; Antrim Direct Assessment Unit.

#### **Cardiac Cath Labs**

NIAS paramedics will transport

#### Falls

Referral to a falls team for patients over 65 who have fallen and remained at home.

#### Seizures

Treat and leave pathways for patients with epilepsy who have had a seizure.
